Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-specie youth livestock quality assurance program that focuses on food safety, animal well-being, and character development. It is required for all Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and KJLS exhibitors. Several packers who purchase base bid animals at the local level require it as well. With the exception of those kids who test out at the beginning of the intermediate or senior age divisions, it is an annual certification. Record Book Judging:

Just a few notes to follow up on the record books. First, A big thank you goes out to all the volunteers who came into the offices and helped judge. This takes time and energy and our office can not thank you enough. Next are just a few thoughts about how to be more successful as you move forward. We all know in the agricultural industry as well in everyday life that keeping records is a valuable tool which allows us to set goals, prioritize and make management decisions that affect the outcomes of our successes and failures. When looking at a record book I would hope that you use it as a tool of reflection more than just a way to win an award. Evaluate the successes and challenges and how you can adapt or grow in your project area. Next, have you looked at the scoring rubric? How records are entered make an impact on the scoring of your book. I would encourage you to do so to not miss out on easy points to be gained. Areas that tend to be missed are in project leadership and citizenship! I know many members have done more than they have actually listed in their books and the score reflects that in many cases. If none were identified then make a plan to incorporate them into your project area. In many cases, Learning Experiences only had one item listed. I find it difficult to believe that more skills were not gained in these areas. I always say, you need at least five goals and should have a minimum of three learning experiences that go along with each goal which would give at least fifteen total. Our hope is to have a Record Book workshop this spring as I am finishing up on some Z-Book training and might suggest this as an option moving forward to assist in the completion of your records. Please look for further information to come, and congratulations to those who made a difference as county champions.

Horse Project News:

The Kansas 4-H Horse ID Certificate (P1039) has been updated for the 2025 4-H program year. Beginning with the 2025 4-H program year, please use the new form and destroy previously used 4-H Horse ID Certificates. As a reminder, to properly identify your horse, complete the 4-H Horse ID Certificate, and have your Extension Agent sign it and copy it. A COPY of the Horse ID Certificate is kept on file in the Extension Office and the 4-H Horse member maintains the ORIGINAL certificate. The original certificate is presented by the 4-H member to show staff for check-in at the local 4-H horse shows. Beginning in 2025, registration papers WILL NOT be accepted to identify horses for the 4-H Horse project. - Ownership deadline for breeding animals of any species is <u>May 1st.</u>
- Poultry and Rabbit ownership deadline is May 31st.
- Horse Papers are due to the Extension Office by May 31st. This means that the horse/horses that are submitted to the office are the only ones allowed to be used for the County Fair.
- Dog vaccine records are due to the Extension Office by May 31st

Creative Ideas to Enhance Your Club Meetings and Participation

BACKWARDS MEETING: Start the meeting with the motion for adjournment and go from there! The entire meeting is backwards. Members and parents might even want to dress backwards. Talk about really learning the meeting order; this will do it! PARTICIPATION INCENTIVES: This works best when the officers or leaders take charge. When members make a motion, give discussion or ask a question, attend a discovery days, camps, project meetings, they can be presented with an incentive. This might just increase club participation! Incentives can be "traveling, leaderboard poster, Royals Game voucher, 4-H promo item, etc. CRAZY THEME DAY: One meeting could be jazzed up by incorporating a fun theme. During roll call, members may show off and tell the story behind what they brought to match the theme. Suggested themes include a mismatched day, 4-H green day, hat day, pajamas day, crazy shoe day, tie day, bring a stuffed animal day, sunglasses day, backwards clothing day and dress as your parents' day. These are just some examples. Have the club help you create more or add more yourself. INVITE A FRIEND: Encourage members to invite their friends who are not members of 4-H to a meeting. Have a special introduction ceremony for the club guests. Be sure to include information on how to join 4-H. HAVE A SECRET WORD CONTEST: When the Secretary reads the minutes of the previous meeting, a secret word can be inserted. Members will listen closely to determine what the word is. Members who then use the word in some way during the meeting can receive a small prize from the club's supply tote. Secret word examples include popsicle, pillow, jellybean, clover, and armadillo.
